I was privileged to know Bill when we were both members of the West Chester Rotary Club. Bill has the District record of 67 years of perfect attendance.

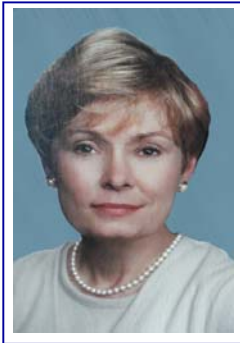

They also experienced ways alternative learners, adult groups and Rotary Clubs can practice teamwork, leadership and communication skills while having a lot of fun. Ardmore Rotary Club raises \$38,000 for restoration of Garden for Blind project



Ardmore Rotary Club presented a check for \$38,000 which was raised from community groups, Rotarians, and Rotary Club of Tokyo to Lower Merion Township for the restoration of the Garden for the Blind and Children in Wynnewood Valley Park. PP Klepfer undertook the private-public project while president of the Club during Rotary's Centennial year. Ardmore Rotary Club presented the Garden to Lower Merion Township in 1977. At the time the Tokyo Rotary Club presented 25 cherry trees for the Garden for the Blind to Ardmore Rotary in appreciation for 300 dogwood trees which the Club sent to their club in 1970 to replace dogwood trees in Imperial Gardens donated in 1920s by the United States. Last year, the Tokyo Club sent a check for \$10,000 to Ardmore Rotary Club which used a portion to plant cherry trees in the Garden as well as in several other parks and schools. Work began on the restoration of the Garden early this month with a scheduled completion late this year. The bulk of the cost will come from a federal grant received by Lower Merion.

Kennett and Longwood Rotarians host Rotarians from Ivory Coast



Kennett Square and Longwood Rotary Clubs hosted a reception June 14 for members of nine visiting Rotary Clubs from the Cote D'Ivoire (Ivory Coast) at the Hotel DuPont in Wilmington Delaware. Representing the Kennett Square Rotary Club were Jerry Poe, Steven Cho, Al Schmitt and Eleanor Sylver. Representing the Longwood Rotary Club were Andy Dean, Dave Harandon, Dennis Fisher and DGE Bonnie Korengel. The Rotary Clubs from the Ivory Coast, along with Kennett Square and Longwood Rotary Clubs, helped to sponsor two young men, Ouloide "Yannick" Goue and "Eric Marc" Kouadio, to study at Lincoln University. The Rotary Clubs of the Ivory Coast have been able to make a comeback after several years of civil war. Rotarians from the Ivory Coast were very appreciative of the support for Eric-Marc and Yao Kouadio, who recently graduated from Lincoln University. During the visit, the Rotarians spoke about areas that would support the efforts of Rotary in the Ivory Coast such as, water resources (building wells), educational opportunities (instructional supplies), and other collaborative projects which the Rotary Clubs could sponsor.

Local example of 'Bridging continents' in Rotary

Patricia DeMay, secretary for the Glenside Rotary Club, responded to an appeal from Jay Childress, Rotary International District 7450 administrative assistant, seeking a Rotarian to transport a visiting Rotarian from Pakistan at a hotel near the airport to a Rotary Club meeting the next day.

DeMay, who wears "I am a Rotarian" on her "conversation starter" name tag at her bank job, said, "My first thoughts were logistic ... I am off from work on Friday, but I need to take my 86-year old mother to her 11 a.m. doctor's appointment. If I am late for our 12:15 p.m. Rotary meeting, it is not terribly bad but if I am bringing someone with me I need to be sure to get there. Then I considered the time to drive from Huntingdon Valley to the airport, the airport to home, home to the doctor, the doctor to Rotary and decided it was tight but it could be done. I told Jay I could do it. She gave me Mr. Bashir Malik's phone number and I made the connection.

"The next day as I drove to the airport, I began to think about what I knew about Pakistan. All I know is what I hear and read in the news. He is most likely Muslim. Is it appropriate to offer to shake hands? Will he be offended to have a woman drive him to the meeting? Will my seven-year old Toyota Echo be too small? Am I dressed appropriately enough? Even though it was 90 degrees out, I grabbed a sweater as I left the house because the blouse I wore was sleeveless. What will we talk about?

"When we met in the hotel lobby, Mr. Malik extended his hand. He is short by American standards, around 5'6", neatly groomed with a closely cropped beard., and wore a business suit. He spoke perfect English. As we road along Rt. 95 N, I pointed out the Naval Yard, the oil refineries, the industry along the Delaware River, the skyline of center city

Philadelphia, and across the river in New Jersey. We talked about the commercial and residential areas of Mayfair and Fox Chase and compared it to housing in Pakistan.

"When we arrived at my house we had just enough time for Mr. Malik to have a glass of water and load my mother into the car and be off again. A nurse at the house had helped my mother shower and dress. This prompted

questions about health care in the United States. How it is that I have a nurse who visits to care for my mom?.

"We sat for an hour at the doctor's office... when my mother saw her doctor, she told him that we needed to be quick because we had a visiting dignitary from Pakistan with us and we needed to get him to a meeting

"We arrived at the Glenside Rotary meeting a little late but in time for Mr. Malik to enjoy lunch and observe the installation of our officers. He made a presentation about his trip to the United States and the Foundation he is heading. Then on the road again to the airport and Mr. Malik talked about the need for healthcare in Pakistan for the poor and how he is building a hospital for woman and children. He hopes to expand the hospital to become an education facility. The wealthy in Pakistan can go to school; the poor have no education or the education is provided by

the "religious." We talked about his children and grandchildren.

As we began to leave our guest at his hotel, my mother told him that he was a "cutie petutie" which I roughly translated into "she says you are handsome." He said he would call on my mother the next time he is visiting the United States.

"For just a few short hours I had an opportunity to learn something about someone from another part of the world. A part of the world that seems to be strange and foreign based on our media. And I had a chance to show him a

We have reserved the spectacular *Ballroom at the Ben* in the historic section of Philadelphia and we anticipate that we will have many dignitaries and guests on hand to meet and greet our president."

The Philadelphia Rotary Club was the 19th to be chartered by RI in April 1911.

Joe Batory joined Philadelphia Rotary Club following his retirement after 15 years as Upper Darby School District Superintendent of Schools. He was named one of the Top 100 educational leaders among the 300,000 practicing school administrators in North America and received the Lifetime Distinguished Service Award from the American Association of School Administrators. In retirement, he is an associate in Educational Enterprises LLC, an educational research and evaluation company.
